Of the ten large War Relocation Authority facilities to hold Nikkei during WW II, the one called Tule Lake became America's worst concentration camp. Barbara Takei and Roger Daniels are writing a book to explain why they believe this was the case. They will also reveal and discuss how, in the postwar decades, Tuleans were often scapegoated by Nikkei from other camps and by the Japanese American Citizens League. Additionally, this event will share the importance of the UCLA Asian American Studies Center's Suyama Project, which aims to preserve the history of Japanese American resistance during World War II, including, but not limited to the 100th/442nd Regimental Combat Team draftees, Army and draft resisters, No-Nos, renunciants, and other Nikkei dissidents of World War II.
